## **Start a Flight Pattern for Justice**

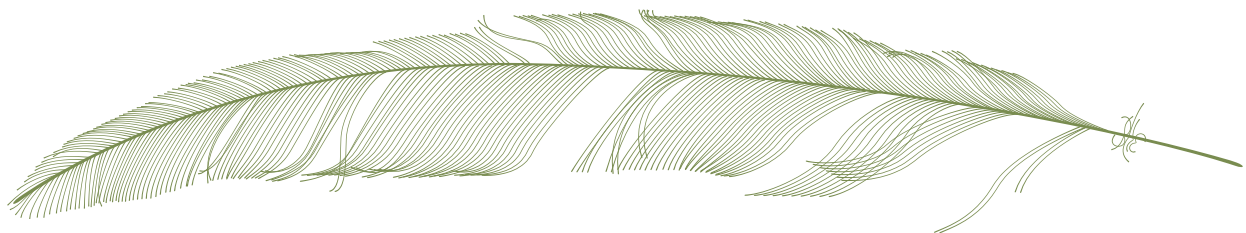
Keep the math going. You are a Girl Scout Ambassador. There are thousands more of you across the country—and if you add in your WAGGGS sisters around the world, you could get a whole lot of justice going.

What would you like to do to share equations for justice with girls across the country and around the world? You might consider closing your journey with some digital connections.

## **Fly Back**

Do some more math. You have millions (truly!) of younger Girl Scout sisters. Start with the thousands in your own region, or even just those in your school district. What did you do along this *JUSTICE* journey that you can “pass on down” to inspire your younger sisters?

- *Can you share your equation so they can build on it?*
- *Perhaps your closing ceremony can be a way to hand off a call to justice to younger girls.*
- *If you're feeling crafty, how about a making a keepsake of some kind that contains your equation and invites incoming Ambassadors to add their own?*

## Up, Up, and Away

Talk to the people you have presented your equation to. What commitment did you ask them to make? Are they Doing the Math? If you've taken the *Your Voice, Your World* journey, can you find some evidence of “the butterfly effect” you may have started (big or small).

Celebrate by creating a poem, sketch, photo collage, or other expression that shows what happens when people come together to seek justice.

## Nest

Perhaps you and your Ambassadors friends are ready for a team huddle, a chance to celebrate your accomplishments along this journey. You might emphasize personal accomplishments—like your efforts to explore careers or get better at resolving conflicts. Celebrate your public accomplishments, too—like Doing the Math and sharing your equation.

Cook (or bake) your favorite treats (recipes are equations, too!), gather your team, and enjoy being Ambassadors—together!

### SAGE TEA, ANYONE?

Remember the recipe for Sage Tea that you learned early on in the journey? How about making some for this final celebration? Here are the directions:

Pour 1 cup of boiling water over 1 tablespoon of fresh sage leaves or 1–2 teaspoons of dried sage. Let steep for 3–5 minutes. Strain and add lemon and honey, if desired.
